HAMBURG AREA HIGH SCHOOL POST-SECONDARY PLANNING TIMELINE FOR JUNIORS

11th Fall

• Ensure that you have the credits and test scores needed to meet both HAHS and State graduation requirements (Act 158). Work hard to achieve the grades needed for your post-secondary plan.

- o Find a Career/Major Continue to explore careers and areas of interest.
- o **Use resources like SMART FUTURES** <u>www.smartfutures.org</u> (user/password is hasdlunchnumb/ lunchnumb), and <u>www.pacareerzone.org</u> and <u>www.bls.gov</u>
- o **College-Bound** Did you take the **PSAT/NMSQT**? (offered once in October) In addition to SAT prep, this is the qualifying exam for the National Merit Scholarship Service.
- Career-Bound/Military Take the ASVAB exam, a military entry exam that also provides results of student's knowledge and ability in several career areas. Offered once each year in October.
- Make a list of post-secondary schools that meet your most important criteria (major, size, location, cost, distance from home, academic rigor, graduation, rate, etc.) Here is a list of just a few college-search sites:

- o **Job Shadow** Seek out opportunities to shadow various career field(s) of interest. Make an appointment with Mrs. Del Conte to learn more about shadowing or a PFE (internship) in senior year.
- o **Student Athletes** If you are a competitive athlete and strong student you might be considering sports in college. To play D1 or D2 athletics, students must register with the NCAA, have taken PS or Honors courses that meet the NCAA requirements, and have a core GPA of 2.3 or higher by the end of 11th grade (excludes all electives).
- o **Military Academy** Always wanted to join the military, strong academics, and physically fit? Consider an academy, offering the highest college experience in military development, discipline, honor, and leadership.

11th Winter

- o Register for an SAT <u>www.sat.org</u> / or ACT <u>www.act.org</u> in the Spring. (Counselors recommend ALL college-bound students still take a minimum of one test, even though many Colleges are test-optional)
- HAHS Junior Post-Secondary Classroom Meeting: January, in History class. Check for uploaded presentation on Counselor webpage> College TAB.
- Visit colleges in person or participate virtually. Pink College Visit form to excuse attendance on days that you
 miss school, located in Main Office.
- Have a discussion with parents about colleges in which you are interested? Examine majors offered, cost, etc.
- Develop your study plan for the SAT and/or the ACT (391-620 CEEB Code). Use PSAT results and Khan Academy.
 Most juniors will test in March, May, or June and again in the Fall of 12th grade.



11th Spring

- Apprentice Consider an apprentice program: Carpenter Union (Lebanon & Allentown #167), Electrical (IBEW Local 743), Elevator Union (Local 524), Finishing Trades/Drywall (Council 21), Fire Sprinkler Union (#692), Ironworker Union (Local), Plumbers (Local 524), Roofers (Local 30), Sheet Metal (Local 19-Hamburg)... to name a few https://apprentice.org/
- o Attend the Spring College Fair field trip, held @ Alvernia University- March 4, 2025. Return permission form.
- Stay involved with your extracurricular activities. Colleges look for consistency and depth in activities.
- Consider whom you will ask to write your recommendations. Think about asking teachers who know you well
 and who will write positive letters about you. Letters from a coach, activity leader, or an adult who knows you
 well outside of school (e.g., volunteer work contact) are also valuable.
- o Visit "Summer Programs" page of the HS Counselor webpage to learn about college & career experiences.
- Apply for a summer job or internship. Get experience to broaden your exposure to the work world.
- Be prepared to pay for college applications, transcripts, and testing fees in fall. Let counselor know if you
 qualify for a fee waiver.

11th Summer

- Visit the campuses of your top college choices. Virtual visits are available at www.collegeweeklive.com and other websites, but getting on the campus will be the most valuable experience.
- Send a thank-you note after each college interview or meeting with a college representative.
- o If taking another SAT or ACT, begin your study plan now. www.sat.org or www.act.org
- o Finalize any PFE experience with employer and Mrs. Del Conte.
- Absolutely no schedule changes after August. Be mindful of your course requests and schedule before school begins.

Scholarship Tips

Scholarships, unlike student loans, don't have to be repaid and can reduce the cost of college. The more free money (from scholarships and grants) that you find to help pay for college, the less you'll have to borrow.



Eligibility

Students who apply for scholarships must meet specific eligibility requirements and will be competing against other applicants. Scholarship eligibility may be based on any combination of criteria, including:

- Residency (state, county, or town in which the student lives)
- Affiliation with community or religious organizations
- Extracurricular activities, including community service
- Degree program, major, or field of study
- Financial need
- Essays
- Academic, athletic, or artistic achievement
- Letters of recommendation



Searching

Many high school students begin searching for scholarships during their junior year. However, there are scholarship opportunities for younger students, as well as current college students. Scholarship information is available from these resources:

- High school website
- High school counselor's office or online portal
- Local library
- College or university
- National scholarship search sites (examples listed on the back)



Applying

To apply for scholarships:

- Determine that all eligibility requirements are met.
- Submit all required application materials by the deadline.
- Find out if applicants are notified of the results. (Some scholarships notify all applicants; others notify only the winners.)



Q. What is a merit scholarship?

A. Colleges are increasingly offering merit scholarships—and not just for academic achievement or athletic skill. Schools may offer merit scholarships to attract diverse groups of students from states not highly represented at the school, or students with talents or circumstances that few others at the school have. Check with admissions offices at schools you're applying to and ask if they offer merit aid.

Q. Should students pay a company to find scholarships?

A. Students and families need to know that some scholarship offers are not what they seem. You can avoid getting scammed by ignoring offers that require you to attend a "free" seminar, pay a "small fee," or provide a credit card number.

Q. Will scholarships affect other sources of financial aid?

A. Scholarships from outside sources may affect other financial aid. By filling unmet need, scholarships may reduce the amount a family has to pay out-of-pocket or they may reduce loans, work-study, or grant aid. Check with your school's financial aid office to find out how outside scholarships may affect your financial aid offer.

Q. How are winners determined?

A. Although scholarships are competitive, keep in mind that you don't have to be the best student in your class to receive one. You simply need to be the best applicant who meets the qualifications for the scholarship.

DIVISION I ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To study and compete at a Division I school, you must earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits, earn a corresponding test score* that matches your core-course GPA and submit your final transcript with proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center.

CORE-COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:

For Division I, 10 of your 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits must be completed before the start of your seventh semester, including seven in English, math or science.

OUALIFIER

As a Division I qualifier, you may practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment at an NCAA Division I school.

- » Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the right areas.
 - o Complete 10 of your 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits, including seven in English, math or science, before the start of the seventh semester.
 - o Complete your 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in eight academic semesters or four consecutive academic years from the start of ninth grade.
- » Earn a corresponding test score that matches your core-course GPA (minimum 2.3) on the Division I Sliding Scale.*
- » Submit your final transcript with proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center.

ACADEMIC REDSHIRT

As a Division I academic redshirt, you may practice during your first regular academic term and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment but may NOT compete during your first year of enrollment. You must pass either eight quarter or nine semester hours to practice in the next term.

- » Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the right areas.
- » Earn a corresponding test score that matches your core-course GPA (minimum 2.0) on the Division I sliding scale.*
- » Submit your final transcript with proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center.

Division II Academic Standards

Division II schools require you to meet academic standards. To be eligible to practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship in your first year of full-time enrollment, you must meet the following requirements:

- 2. Earn a minimum 2.2 core-course GPA.
- 3. Ask your high school counselor to upload your final official transcript with proof of graduation to your Eligibility Center account.

EARLY ACADEMIC QUALIFIER

If you meet specific criteria after six semesters of high school, you may be deemed an early academic qualifier for Division II and may practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment.

QUALIFIER

You may practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment.

PARTIAL QUALIFIER

You may practice and receive an athletics scholarship but may NOT compete during your first year of full-time enrollment.
