## Flu Vaccine Facts & Myths

**MYTH** "The flu isn't a serious disease."

**FACTS** Influenza (flu) is a serious disease of the nose, throat, and lungs, and it can lead to pneumonia. Each year about 200,000 people in the U.S. are hospitalized and about 36,000 people die because of the flu. Most who die are 65 years and older. But small children less than 2 years old are as likely as those over 65 to have to go to the hospital because of the flu.

**MYTH** "The flu shot can cause the flu."

**FACTS** The flu shot cannot cause the flu. Some people get a little soreness or redness where they get the shot. It goes away in a day or two. Serious problems from the flu shot are very rare.

**MYTH** "The flu shot does not work."

**FACTS** Most of the time the flu shot will prevent the flu. In scientific studies, the effectiveness of the flu shot has ranged from 70% to 90% when there is a good match between circulating viruses and those in the vaccine. **Getting the vaccine is your best protection against this disease.**

**MYTH** "The side effects are worse than the flu."

**FACTS** The worst side effect you're likely to get from a shot is a sore arm. The nasal mist flu vaccine might cause nasal congestion, runny nose, sore throat and cough. The risk of a severe allergic reaction is less than 1 in 4 million.

**MYTH** "Only older people need a flu vaccine."

**FACTS** Adults and children with conditions like asthma, diabetes, heart disease, and kidney disease **need to get a flu shot**. Doctors also recommend children 6 months and older get a flu shot every year until their 5th birthday.

**MYTH** "You must get the flu vaccine before December."

**FACTS** Flu vaccine can be given before or during the flu season. The best time to get vaccinated is October or November. **But you can get vaccinated in December or later.**



# King’s Dead a new revival

King’s Dead is a new hip-hop single made in preparation for Top Dawg Entertainment signee Jay Rock’s new album. The single released earlier this month on January 11 and makes references to characters from Marvel’s Black Panther series. Shortly, it was revealed that King’s Dead will also be a part of the Black Panther soundtrack, for the film releasing next month. # Why everyone needs an Amazon Echo in their life

“Alexa, good morning” is something my personal Amazon Echo Dot hears on an almost daily basis as I am rushing out the door for school. With a simple good morning, I am met with a daily fact, relevant to the day. For example, on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, I said “good morning” to my Amazon device and was given not only a fact about Martin Luther King Jr., but an encouragement to ask her more facts about Black History Month. Though I like to keep up to date with my trivial knowledge, Amazon’s Echo series is so much more.

I originally wanted an Amazon Echo Dot because it was affordable and offered a hands-free way to listen to my favorite music through its built in speakers and for random questions like “What’s the weather today?”. When I received my Echo Dot for Christmas, I was eager to set it up and begin the barrage of random requests. “Alexa, play Jeopardy.” “Alexa, who was the governor of Pennsylvania in 1901?”, “Alexa, play ‘Hey Ya’ by Outkast”- and the list goes on and on. What I have found, from my endless tinkering with its abilities, is that my favorite Echo function is the ability to connect to bluetooth devices, completely hands free. As someone who likes to listen to music and podcasts wherever I am, I was worried I would be tied-down to wherever I decided to put my Echo Dot, but that is certainly not the case. By setting up my already-owned speakers in other rooms, I am able to simply say, “Alexa, connect to speaker” and ask her to play whatever music I want without even touching my phone. In addition to simply playing music, an Amazon Echo has many smart home capabilities. It can dim lights, lock doors, enable security systems, in addition to the simple tasks we all would ask of our personal Alexas.

The Amazon Echo is available in many different shapes and styles. The Amazon Echo Dot, the least expensive of the series, can range anywhere from \$30 to \$50 and is available in two colors. It has all the capabilities a normal Echo has, but with half the size and speaker quality. The Echo is a taller version of the Echo Dot with substantially better speakers costs about \$100. The Echo Plus has even better speaker quality, with a price of \$150. The Echo Show is a compacted Echo with a screen that can be used in a car for hands-free GPS services or in-home for facetimeing and other screen-based purposes, costing \$115. The Echo Show is the enlarged version of the Spot, with a much bigger screen, costing \$180. The Echo Look is a personal stylist assistant that doubles as a camera and a stylist judging your daily outfits. This “Clueless” gadget costs \$200. Whatever the budget or need there is an Amazon Echo for everyone!

One of Albright's main values is that work in the classroom should also be accompanied with real experience outside of the classroom. Albright offers many different intern positions and opportunities to work closer with professors and other professionals. Students are also expected to attend a certain amount of "experience events" a year that encourage students to branch out and try new things.

The campus is relatively safe due to emergency telephones places throughout the campus that call the Public Safety Office. The college also has a shuttle system to help students without cars get around the city safely.

All full-time students are required to live on campus. There are six traditional residence halls, Albright Court, Mohn, North, Krause, Crowell, Smith, and Walton Halls. Mohn Hall is also the academic honors residence hall and is available to students of all class years. There are also two apartment style residential areas for sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

The total tuition for an undergraduate student including board and food plans is \$55,060. Since their tuition is on the pricy side they also offer a good amount of scholarship money to accepted students. The highest ranked major at Albright is their Accounting program. They also offer majors ranging from Art Administration to Computer Science and Digital Communications.

Depression is a common mental illness that is sorely undertreated within our social system. Unfortunately, depression goes untreated in 80 percent of the people who have it. The symptoms may be hard to see from the outside, but it is essential to know the signs and be able to recognize them in friends and family in order to help them. Katelynn Sepke, a senior, when asked about signs of depression she knew, answered, "They talk less than usual, and they are more withdrawn from friends and family." When Mrs. Machamer, the guidance counselor, was also asked to give advice, she commented, "It is important for the student to tell their friend that they care about them, and to be willing to listen. Sometimes, we go through tough times and simply need someone to talk to or to feel like someone is listening. Teens are actually great advice-givers (most times) and so being able to talk to someone like you who 'gets you' can be very meaningful. Also, try to include the friend in activities and encourage them to join in something that they might enjoy. Other times, the depression is more severe, so for example when someone does not want to leave their bed, eating habits drastically change, they are no longer interested in things they once were, and are withdrawn, the concerned student should reach out to an adult like a school counselor or their parent. "

The signs and symptoms of depression can vary between each individual. Signs that are able to be discerned from an outside perspective are few. One sign is if the person always seeming tired or unmotivated to do tasks. They may find it difficult to do everyday tasks. The person may also become disinterested in their health and neglect eating altogether. They might not be able to find the energy within themselves to go shopping for food. The individual may also seem to be messy or not care about their physical appearance. With the depression making the person feel or become isolated, they have no motivation to clean up themselves and their space. They may also become disinterested in activities they used to love or seek out in times of sadness. They may avoid activities that make them happy. The biggest indicator of someone with depression is the individual having an obsession with death or dying. They may refer to themselves in the past tense or talk about when they are gone. This may turn into suicidal thoughts and actions.

It may be hard to admit these symptoms as signs of depression for both parties involved. It is crucial, however, to seek help before the situation becomes more serious.


