
2020 has already proved to be a very eventful year. There have been fires in Australia, a new Coronavirus in China, and now a plague of locusts in Africa to be added to

Additionally, research done by The New England Journal of Medicine has shown that dance may boost memory. Aerobics



CD Review: Danger Days: The True Lives of the Fabulous Killjoys - My Chemical Romance

Danger Days: The True Lives of the Fabulous Killjoys, often shortened to Danger Days, is the fourth and most recent album from American rock group My Chemical Romance. It was also the band's last album before they went on a six year hiatus that spanned from 2013 to 2019. The album was released on November 22, 2010, meaning that this year will mark the tenth anniversary of the release.

Danger Days is a concept album, meaning that the songs featured all share a common theme and mean more when they are

listened to together, rather than individually. The album follows the story of the "Killjoys," the fictional alter-egos of the members of the band that were shown in music videos; lead singer Gerard Way as "Party Poison," guitarist and backup vocalist Frank lero as "Fun Ghoul," guitarist and backup vocalist Ray Toro as "Jet-Star," and bassist Mikey Way as "The Kobra Kid." The group are rebels living in a post-apocalyptic California in 2019, and the album follows them as they battle the evil Better Living Industries (BL/ind.) corporation.

The first single off the album, "Na Na Na," shows how Killjoys live on a daily basis until they are attacked by BL/ind and "The Girl," a child that was with the Killjoys, was captured. The third single from the album and the second and final music video in the Killjoys installment, "SING," depicts the Killjoys' fight to get "The Girl" back. Four more songs were released as singles off the album, "The Only Hope for Me is You," "Planetary (Go!)," "Bulletproof Heart," and "The Kids from Yesterday," though the music videos for "Planetary (Go!)" and "The Kids from Yesterday" do not relate to the two other music videos.

The overall sound of Danger Days has more of a pop rock feel to it, unlike My Chemical Romance's other albums, that have a heavier rock sound. The album is so different from The Black Parade and Three Cheers for Sweet Revenge, but that is what fans love about this album and what brought many positive reviews from critics. It is a departure from what, at the time, was known from My Chemical Romance.
