



Celebrate Groundhog Day

On February 2 people in Canada and the US, especially Pennsylvania, will celebrate Groundhog Day. This holiday originated in Germany a very long time ago. Germans used to do a tradition called Candlemas (Badger Day) on February 2. They thought that if a Bager woke up on a sunny day, came out of its den, and saw its shadow, there would be four more weeks of winter.

The Pennsylvania Dutch, who are immigrants from Germany, thought this tradition was very important, so they decided to continue it, but make it their own. Instead of having a badger, they decided to use a groundhog. They named the groundhog Punxsutawney Phil since the main festivities were held in Punxsutawney, PA. They also made it six more weeks of winter instead of four weeks. This means that if the groundhog saw its own shadow, then there would be six more weeks of winter. However if he did not see his shadow then this means that spring will come early. The first ever actual Groundhog day was celebrated on February 2, 1887.

People speculate each year what they think the groundhog's predictions are, if there will be more winter or an early spring. Layne Schroeder and Greta Fink think that Phil will see his shadow. Ana Smith on the other hand believes and hopes that spring will come early for all of us.

"I hope there is more winter," said Graylea Knight. People can predict and hope all they want, but Punxsutawney Phil is only about 39% accurate. This means that there is a very low chance of his prediction actually being true in the end. This year will be the 139th celebration of Groundhog Day. Many people from all over will come to celebrate with crowds up to 40,000 people. That is nearly eight times the yearly population of

All of the categories are Business, Career & Tech Education, Com munications, Community Service, Computer Science, Math, Performing Arts, Environment/Science, Social Studies/History, and Visual Arts. The Berks County Community Foundation selects one student from each category and awards them a \$500 scholarship In addition, a picture and brief description of them will be published in the Reading Eagle.

How one student lost his work

Students occasionally experience an error when submitting their work. When "control-z" is not an option, they may have to restart their work with knowledge from their lost assignments. Many have experienced something similar and lost a significant portion of their work. However, what is often most important in those situations is how students take ownership of their work to turn it in

Tyler Adams is a HAHS junior in the school's Game Theory Design class. Recently, he lost a huge portion of his work due to a computer error. He explained that the project he worked on in Unity's game engine before Christmas break got corrupted. He had saved it on his computer as he always does, but when he returned from break, all his work was corrupted with no apparent cause. It deleted many game assets like objects and much of his coding, all of which had taken him two months to make. Though some aspects were preserved like scripts, Unity's coding language that adds function to objects, he had to troubleshoot them for errors. For example, 15 things in his game broke because a single letter in a script was lowercase. Despite the inconvenience, Tyler restarted the project and completed it by working on it during class and Flex for three days.

Mr. King teaches the Game Theory Design class. He primarily makes his deadlines to signify when the class is moving to a new topic. The goal is to turn work in on time, but he accepts late work because he feels teaching students a course-relevant skill is more important than giving them life skills like timeliness. Moreover, he grades based on one's understanding of the course material to reflect the knowledge gained. Despite his leniency, he states that he cannot grade what he does

not have, making it a student's responsi-bility to complete their incomplete and

Nevertheless, Mr. King sometimes vorks with students to rectify their assignments. For example, if he closely followed a student's project before an ncident, he might assign a smaller assignment to demonstrate their understanding. In the past, however, many have submitted nothing after losing their work, and it is rare for students to go to Mr. King to make a plan. Still, hard-working students like Tyler often ask for help to turn in their lost work. In his case, he had until the end of the marking period to turn in his project. As such, he worked diligently during FLEX period to complete his assignment over three days.

Students are sometimes dealt a bad hand and accidentally lose their hard work. Those in a similar situation should remember that teachers want their students to succeed and can be lenient depending on the circumstances. Also, it is important not to dwell on what is already lost. Instead, students should show a desire to submit their work and take

Moxie



Students Review SZA's Long Awaited Extension to the Grammy Award Winning Album SOS

On December 19, students at Hamburg were excitedly waiting for midnight because SZA had promised to release the deluxe edition of her hit album SOS. When midnight came on December 20, the album was not released, leaving fans refreshing their phones all day. Finally, at 3:00 PM, SZA released the album, titled SOS Deluxe: LANA. She had first told fans back in August 2023 that the deluxe version, called LANA, would come out in the fall, but nothing happened until December 2024. The album includes 14 new songs and one previously released track, Saturn, which was released in February after SZA performed it live at the Grammy Awards.

LANA starts with a mellow intro titled No More Hiding, where SZA opens up about finding her true self and not apologizing for it. She sings, "No more hiding, I want to be the real me, ugly," showing she is ready to embrace who she really is, even if others view it as ugly. The calm vibe of the intro continues throughout the album, including the song Crybaby. In Crybaby, SZA takes accountability and talks about how things can go wrong, referencing Murphy's Law which is the idea that anything that can go wrong will go wrong. After Crybaby comes Kitchen, which is what I believe is a standout track on the album where SZA reflects on the struggle of doing what is right for herself while trying to please others. I think it is a stand out track on the album because it is a song that could deeply resonate with listeners. The album wraps up with the final track, Saturn. In Saturn, SZA expresses how she feels Earth is not where she belongs. She describes feeling trapped and wanting to escape reality, singing, "Life's better on Saturn. Got to break this pattern of floating away. Find something worth saving, I always say, I'll be better on Saturn." After finishing the album, I realized it is almost the opposite of the original SOS. In SOS, SZA seems like she is searching for her true self and feeling stuck in a false narrative. But in LANA, she has found herself and fully embraces who she is without shame.

Freshman Brooklyn Scheffler also gave LANA a listen and shared her thoughts on the album. Brooklyn said that she definitely enjoyed it and would listen to it again in the future. When asked about her favorite song, she said Kitchen stood out the most, which also happens to be one of my favorites. She explained, "I really like the lyrics, and I really like the instrumental. It is very smooth and calming." Brooklyn appreciated how the song's message and tone felt relatable and relaxing, making it a standout track for her. However, she did point out one critique about the album, many of the songs have a similar sound. She felt that while the overall vibe of the album was enjoyable, a bit more different sounds in the tracks would have made it even better. Despite this, Brooklyn agreed that the album is worth listening to and commented on SZA's ability to create a calming and emotional experience for listeners, almost as if the listener is experiencing what SZA is expe-
