Five Hamburg Juniors accepted to MHP program

The Medical Health Professions (MHP) program is for Berks County seniors who are aspiring to work in the medical field. 16 schools are eligible to apply for this program, and five upcoming seniors from Hamburg were accepted. This is a huge accomplishment for Hamburg, and all the teachers and students should be proud of these individuals' hard work. Josie Keith is the only senior this year tackling the MHP program, and next year it will be Tamandeep Saggi, Catharine Wingle, Emilee Kachel, Julie Harbonic and Caitlin Steele. Mrs. Claire Benz, HAHS career specialist, notes that all of the applicants from Hamburg are women; the future really is female. Mrs. Benz acts as the link between the applicants and Berks Career and Technology Center as the applications are submitted to BCTC. The program is a collaboration between BCTC, the Reading Hospital and Penn State Berks. The program includes two college level classes at Penn State Berks: biology and chemistry. There are challenging courses, so a prerequisite to apply is a 3.0 GPA in biology, chemistry and algebra II in high school. The students also spend time in BCTC and Reading Hospital learning how to work advanced medical technology and talk to patients. Being able to manage high school and preparing for their future at the same time shows extreme dedication. The MHP program prepares the students for further study into the medical field and allows them to explore what job they want in the future. For the application, these five had to get a recommendation letter from their guidance counselor and a science teacher and write an essay. An excerpt from Caitlin's essay states, "My accomplishments to date are just the first steps of that process; this program would be a giant leap." She cannot wait to find out where she belongs in the medical world, and this program is helping her to chase her dreams. As of now Caitlin does not know what she wants to study after high school, and Tamandeep has her sights set on being an anesthesiologist. Either way, the MHP program will help them to make the decision of what is best for their future. Tamandeep's oldest brother was a part of this program during his senior year. Because of this, she had an extra motivation to apply. She heard stories from when he was in the program, and she knows how much it benefitted him. He got to shadow a childbirth during his senior year in high school - that is phenomenal. Both Caitlin and Tamandeep are grateful that they will be prepared for life after high school during their senior year. They get to plan out their future and get accustomed to what college classes are like. They get to experience bits of college before they are full time college students. Farm to School Spotlight: Olivia Leshar cares for calves

Fourth generation farmer, Olivia Leshar, reveals a typical day on her family farm, otherwise known as Way-Har Farms. Leshar is a calf manager on the farm. Her job is to "maintain the health and nutrition of the calves on the farm," as well as handle vaccinations. For Leshar, after school, a typical day would start by bedding the hutches, or laying down hay in the cowpens, if needed. Afterwards, Leshar would feed the "three main barns of heifers," and, ensure that there are no sick heifers. She checks to make sure the calves do not have a "loss of appetite, cold ears, fever, dehydration" or inability to stand. "Sometimes it is hard to determine if a calf is sick before they show serious signs," meaning it is very important to spend a lot of time with the calves, and "make sure they are all healthy." Next, Leshar feeds each of the calves a gallon of milk, which is done twice a day. Leshar describes the process to making the milk, as well as the feeding process of the calves. "The milk is made by a replacer, mixed up in five gallon buckets with warm water. There are many precautions I need to take when caring for these young animals [calves]. The younger calves are fed on a bottle, and, as they get older, they move to a bucket. Each calf gets fresh grain and water twice a day after they are fed milk." After Leshar feeds the calves, she checks on an employee, who milks the cows, to see if he needs any additional cows from the new barn. There are three groups of cows, one of which is filled with sick or older cows, as well as recently calved cows. In said group, Leshar tends to the cows that require a daily medication or a vaccination. In terms of when Leshar's work-day ends, there is not specific time when the work is complete. "Some nights are 7:30 p.m. or 1 in the morning." Also, at times, Leshar is interrupted by the birth of a new calf. She needs to dry off the calf and give both the calf and the mother their vaccinations. Despite the long hours spent caring for the calves, Leshar enjoys her job. "I love taking care of my animals. It is my main priority." In addition to Leshar's family, Way-Har Farms, they also have a retail store. "We bottle our own milk from our farm. We make 1%, 2%, whole, skim, chocolate, and seasonally strawberry and eggnog. We also sell cheese, made from our milk, and lots of other local food from Berks County." One of the family's main selling points is their hard dipped ice cream, where they sell over 50 flavors to eager customers. Leshar, however, is not too involved with the store, unless they are short handed. Overall, Leshar has a very important role on the farm and finds enjoyment in her job every day. While she is not a fan of milking the cows, as she prefers to work outside, which provides variation in her routine, she loves her role as a calf manager. "My favorite part about my job is knowing that I am doing great things. I love working with animals and making sure they are happy and healthy."

Emilee Kachel accepted into the Medical Health Professions Program

The medical field is a big career path to take in today's society. It is just a matter of who is interested in such a field. Hamburg Area High School junior, Emilee Kachel, along with 39 other high school students in Berks County, have been accepted into the Medical Health Professions Program through BCTC. From her input, she said that in previous years the program only accepted the top 20 in the county, but has since doubled the number due to the amount of applicants. She stated that in order to be accepted into the program, all applicants must write an essay as well as obtain a recommendation from the school guidance counselor and at least one teacher. When reviewing what she wrote in her essay, Emilee talked about why she wanted to follow this path and what her goals were after graduating. In her essay she wrote that she had been interested in nursing since the age of five when her mother was receiving training to become a nurse. Emilee also mentioned that she would watch her mom's training videos over and over because they intrigued to her. She also added moments when she witnessed patients being treated for several various reasons. There was even a time she recalled when she saw a man's hand being treated from him punching a wall due to anger. Although Emilee did not know how many people actually applied for the program, she did say that it is a popular career path to take which can be assumed if they doubled the amount of students to be accepted. Emilee mentioned that one aspect the program offers is to shadow at the hospital and rotate through various departments on Fridays. Aside from an essay and a letter of recommendation, she said that taking the PSAT and grades were a factor. Out of all the positions in this field, Emilee made the claim that most of the students who graduate become a physician out of all the other healthcare occupations. Physicians normally make a base salary of 123-314k per year. Although the nursing program does not complete the training of those accepted, it is meant to get them into college with a head start. Students making career choices like Emilee Kachel are sure to make it somewhere in life.

In the late 70's early '80s my grandfather sold all his cattle and strictly stayed with agricultural farming like wheat, soybeans, corn, and alfalfa." Now the farm functions as mainly a cattle herd for beef which Kyle says, "is way cheaper and healthy than store-bought beef."

Reppert gives some insight on his future and his family farm, " Even though farming will not be my full-time profession, my family has instilled in me the work ethic and character needed to run a successful farm. When I am older I see myself buying my own "hobby farm" aside from my actual job. My hopes are that I can build a successful farm and maybe see three or more generations come out of it so I can teach my kids and grandkids the value of providing for your family through the resources given to us."

Reppert explains how getting up early every day and the physical strain in hot summers though can be harsh, is worth it to help his family business thrive.

Ellen had later appeared on The Tonight Show. She continued making regular appearances on the talk show circuit. Ellen gives and gives, and expects nothing at all in return. She isn’t like most famous comedians or talk show hosts, she gives the people what they want, and is always loyal to her fanbase. Veronica Avila was diagnosed with Osteosarcoma at only 12 years old. She underwent harsh rounds of chemotherapy, multiple surgeries, and a state of the art technological surgery. She had the region of affected bone removed, and had a prosthesis implanted. Throughout this entire time, which has gone on for six years, Veronica turned to The Ellen Show for amusement and happiness. After Ellen heard of this girl, she hand wrote her a note, asking to meet in LA and gave her VIP tickets to a show. As another gift, Ellen gave Veronica \$10,000 towards her education, and an Apple Laptop. “Earlier this year, Ellen and Walmart surprised the entire senior class at Summit Academy with life-changing news: they were all receiving four-year college scholarships! With the help of exceptional teachers and Ellen’s scholarship donation, 93% of Summit Academy’s seniors from last year are currently in college, a majority of whom have selected SUNY schools as their college choice”.

In April, 1997 Ellen DeGeneres did something nobody was expecting. She became the first in sitcom history to become open with addressing her sexuality. ABC refused to air her episode when it came time, and some of her sponsors even withdrew their support. One Day at a Time was debuted on January 6, 2017, on Netflix. The show is produced by Sony Pictures TV's producers Dan Hernandez, Benji Samit, and Patricia Fass Palmer. It stars Justina Machado as Penelope, a single mom, nurse, and a veteran with PTSD raising her children with help from her immigrant mother, Lydia (Rita Moreno). This Cuban-American family makes a cheesy sitcom, a series that can be watched with family and friends. It covers a lot of topics including PTSD, feminism, LGBTQ+ community, religion, etc. Season one had a through-line that focused on Elena, Penelope's daughter, and her coming out to her family in the events leading up to her quinceañera. In the other hand, season two does not have a specific focus, instead it discusses a few issues with society at the same time.

The second season has stories about how Lydia is pursuing citizenship, Elena taking the job of handyman for the building they live in, Penelope and her struggles with school as she is trying to earn a new certification, and Schneider (Todd Grinnell), their landlord and neighbor, opening up about his addiction issues and having a deep talk with Penelope about her PTSD. Schneider talks about his relapse after being sober for a while and how he realized that it was a very serious matter. The show has a studio audience, something that is surprising because not many shows can get away with having the cheesy laughs or "awes" from the audience, but they can get away with it because the show focuses on the problems with society and how the Alvarez family deals with it. Otherwise the style of the show has become unfashionable, unfunny, and even corny. Although, there are a few shows that are also filming with the same style and format and are successful.
