Miss Brink is enrolled in Kutztown University with a major in Music Education and a concentration in violin. Her biggest influences were her high school orchestra and choral teachers who always encouraged her to go above and beyond, as well as to apply her listening, communication, and creativity skills to other aspects of her life. Miss Brink is a wonderful teacher and addition to our Hamburg High School music family.
