A description of the show is described by the Music Theatre International as “Buddy, a young orphan, mistakenly crawls into Santa’s bag of gifts and is transported to the North Pole. The would-be elf is raised, unaware that he is actually a human until his enormous size and poor toy-making abilities cause him to face the truth. With Santa’s permission, Buddy embarks on a journey to New York City to find his birth father and discover his true identity. Faced with the harsh realities that his father is on the naughty list and his half-brother doesn’t even believe in Santa, Buddy is determined to win over his new family and help New York remember the true meaning of Christmas.”

The cast of this school’s musical leads consisted of Travis Noecker (Buddy), Arianna Barata (Jovie), Kristen Martiez (Emily), David Behm (Walter), and Clayton Lash (Michael). Other high school students were Cora Rodriguez (Manager), Ali Reed (Santa), Selena Henne (Deb), Tiana Trabosh (Ms. Greenway/Saleswoman), Ian Fink (Chadwick), Isha Kaur (Miss Matthews/Security Guard 1/Fake Santa), Chevelle Pinter (Charlie), Nishi Vesuwala (Fake Santa), Kristen Buchert (Mrs. Claus), Cadence Jalbert (Tiara/Charlotte), Jaden McAuliffe (Security Guard 2/Fake Santa), and the Ensemble included Hannah Ortiz and Braelyn Rubright. A look at Mitski and upcoming Laurel Hell

Mitsuki Francis Laycock, more commonly known as Mitski, is a 31 year old Japanese-American indie rock singer based in New York City. She recently became widely recognizable through her songs making waves on TikTok over the past two years, most notably “Nobody,” “Washing Machine Heart,” and “Me and My Husband.” However, her history and depth as a musician goes far beyond her top hits. From her debut album Lush in 2012 all the way up to Be the Cowboy in 2018, Mitski’s music is linked under a common thread of heavy topics including her struggles assimilating into American society as a biracial Japanese immigrant, the expectations and objectification of women, isolation, self-destruction, co-dependent relationships, dehumanization of workers, depression, and general life dissatisfaction.

Mitski often moved around in her youth, developing feelings of alienation early on. From Japan, to the Czech Republic, Malaysia, Congo, Turkey, Alabama, and Virginia, she constantly adopted new personas that never really were the real her. She struggled a lot as a teenager, describing angrily how she “had so much intelligence and energy and drive” but instead of using that passion to study more or change the world as she put it, she “directed all that fire inward, and burnt [herself] up.” “Everything was so hard. I just wanted to be dead. I didn’t have anything I was good at, because I didn’t know I could make music yet.” After a night of partying, which she did a lot after graduating high school a semester early with nothing to do, she experienced a creative shift. “I had a keyboard in my room, and I just sat down and started writing this song for the first time. And I thought, this is something I can do? That’s amazing.”

However, fame and the industry presumably became a drain. In 2019 Mitski deleted all social media, removing herself from the public eye and taking an indefinite break from music. Fans were left hanging for three years with no real indication towards the end of the hiatus, at least, until she made her surprise return in October 2021 with her single “Working for the Knife.” She used this song as an outlet to express her complicated feelings towards her career. “It’s about going from being a kid with a dream, to a grown up with a job. [...] And feeling somewhere along the way you got left behind. It’s being confronted with a world that doesn’t recognize your humanity, and seeing no way out of it.” Later in November she released another single, “The Only Heartbreaker,” which was accompanied by the exciting announcement of her new album Laurel Hell that will be released on February 4, 2022. Alongside this, Mitski will take back to the stage and embark on a tour throughout North America and Europe starting on February 17th.

Marvel’s The Eternals

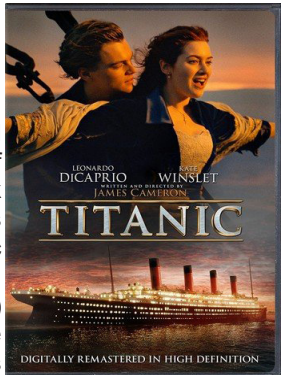

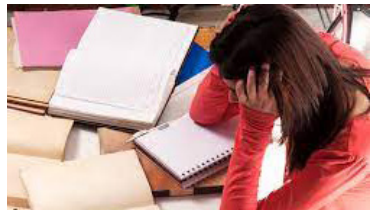
How breaks affect student’s motivation
